After School Club Survey Results – March 2025

We recently conducted a survey in respect to After School Club. Thank you to the many of you who responded. The headline observations are:

- The vast majority of the parents of children who attend ASC are working.
- The reasons for using the ASC are either work commitments, or the child enjoys the activities.
- 86% of those who responded, indicated the variety of activities are good.
- 100% of those who responded are happy with the ASC provision.
- 93% of those who responded indicate that the costs represent value for money.
- 100% of those who responded are would recommend the ASC provision.

Nursery

As part of our 'Understanding The World' curriculum, this week we have begun reading 'Here We Are' by Oliver Jeffers. The children have been participating in fantastic discussions about many of themes within the book such as planets, animals and humans. We will continue to work with this book for a little while to introduce where Jersey is in the planet, the solar system, talking about the land and the sea as well as consolidating lots of topic specific vocabulary. During 'Drawing Club' the children will have the chance to think about what they would like to include in their own planet and have a go at drawing what this might look like.

Many of us are beginning to be able to explain why they agree or disagree. Please help your child to expand on their ideas by encouraging them to reason 'why' they feel a certain way.

Year 1

Firstly, thank you very much to the parents we had the pleasure of meeting this week. It is always a great opportunity to touch base and discuss how your child is progressing.

In Maths, we have been thinking about tens and ones and subtracting from the ones. For example, 16 - 4, we have 1 ten and 6 ones in the number 16 if we partition it (break it apart) so we can leave the 1 ten as it stands and subtract the 4 from the ones only (6-4=2) therefore 1 ten and the 2 ones = $12 \dots 16 - 4 = 12$.

In topic, have are learning about the different jobs a pirate would have on board a ship. Can your child remember any of the jobs and what they entailed? The children will be choosing one job that they would like to apply for, they will write a job description about that job and then we are working towards going through an application process with them to apply for their job. We are very excited about this and can't wait to find our next recruits!

On Thursday, the children attended their first Talking Assembly, which promotes our Oracy agenda. It was a great first experience and the children will become more accustomed to these as we begin to do these more regularly, particularly into next school year.

Museum trip Friday 21st March

We are very excited about our upcoming trip to the Maritime Museum next Friday. **We still need some extra adults to support with this trip to allow us to go**, if you are able to attend with us then please let you child's teacher know a.s.a.p. We will be leaving d'Auvergne at 9:10am and returning to d'Auvergne for 12:00, travelling by coach. We really appreciate all support. The children can come dressed as pirates for this trip. We are aware that this is also Mother Tongue Day (Language Celebration Day) and the children have been asked to come dressed for this, however we would like our children to still come dressed at pirates so they are fully immersed in the trip.

Reminders -

This half term (until Easter), the children will have **both their PE sessions on a Wednesday**. This is temporary for this half term. We have a specialist in on Wednesday afternoons to teach the children dance.

Only book-bags to be brought into school, please no backpacks as we don't have space to store them.

A reminder that snack should be fruit or vegetables only and water is encouraged for during the school day.

Please ensure reading is done every night and the homework planners are signed to reflect this - names of children who are not reading every night with their planners signed will be passed on to Mr Cooper, at his request.

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Year 2

We have had a lovely week, that included candling (shining a bright light) on our eggs that are currently incubating in our classes, to see if they had embryos inside them, that will be developing into chicks. The children were very excited to be involved in this experience and are enjoying the aspect of knowing that we are going to have some real chicks in our class very soon!

This week in Art, the children choose the colour felt and thread they wanted for their Easter pouches. The children very carefully under adult supervision cut the amount of felt they needed for their pouches and choose their extra colours of felt needed for the decorations they are adding to their Easter pouch.

In History, we looked in more detail on how we can attack or defend a castle as this will become a big part of our morning when we re visit Mont Orgueil in a few weeks. The children are going to be designing and building what materials they will need to attack or defend their castle! In maths, we have started our money unit, we have been learning to identify pounds (£) and pence (p) and focusing on the keywords: coin, note, also pounds, penny and pence. So, we are able to write the amount of money in words and numbers. We have been counting money using notes and showing how many different ways, we can make the amount shown, e.g. show $\pounds 65 - \pounds 20 + \pounds 20 + \pounds 20 + \pounds 5 = \pounds 65$. The children continue to develop their fluency in Arithmetic, which is reflected in their weekly tests which are sent home every Friday.

In Science, we continue to learn about Animals and their habitats. This week we learnt about what was an animal's basic needs, and why they are suited to their habitat. Our activity was drawing animals and then describing their habitats, we also discussed what the basic needs a human need to survive.

In Reading the children are enjoying the chapter book 'The owl who was afraid of the dark', we are focusing on fluency, expression and retrieval.

On Thursday 3rd of April, we are going to Mont Orgueil Castle for the morning. We will be leaving school at 9am and returning by lunchtime. Thank you to the parents who have offered to support us with this trip. We now have all the adults that we need. The whole day will be a Medieval Day! The children can come into school on that day dressed in any medieval clothes. Think royalty, knights, archers, cooks or even a gong farmer! (ask your children what this is). In the afternoon we will be having a banquet with medieval music and dancing. For the banquet, if you are able, please could 2A bring in some sweet food including fruit and 2H savoury food. We will then have our banquet together in the hall in the afternoon.

Reminders:

-We are seeing homework diaries coming into school without being signed for reading and spellings not being practiced. Please can you encourage this to be filled in daily.

-Please send a healthy snack and water bottle to school daily.

-Please still send in a coat daily as the weather is unpredictable at the moment.

-Please ensure uniform is worn correctly. Trainers should be for PE days and not on uniform days.

Year 3

It has been another very productive week in Year 3!

In maths we continue to focus on all of number and place values skills in our weekly arithmetic and we are now applying what we know when working on measure and in particular length using mm, cm and m. Please keep working away on those timestables at home, they should be familiar with 2s, 5s and 10s from Year 2 and should be exploring the 3s,4s and 8s.

In writing, we have been reminding ourselves of the features we would use in a diary. We re-read Escape from Pompeii focusing on the part where Mount Vesuvius erupts and a WAGOLL so that we are clear on what features we need to use in our independent writing.

We have also continued to be creative this week. In reading we have continued to work on finding out about Vivienne Westwood's life and in our art lesson we have been practising our sewing skills and designing our own bags using what we have learnt as inspiration.

We have also continued to work on our designs and technical drawings for our tipper trucks and will soon be constructing these with a partner using a checklist to make sure that our models work well.

We are working on adding expression to the poem we are going to be performing in front rest of the school, if you could look at the words with your children at home this would be amazing, so that then they can focus on the actions as we rehearse.

Our commitment towards developing our oracy also continues and this week we have introduced talk tokens to ensure that they children all have an equal opportunity to share their ideas during discussions, take time to think about what they want to say and listen more carefully throughout a discussion. In additions we have been practising inviting people into the conversation too.

We have also been focusing on Article 2 from the Children's Rights. This included exploring discrimination and equality. The children had a really good discussion on this, but we will continue to build on our learning and ideas throughout next week where we will be focusing on neurodiversity and getting involved in International Mother Languages Day.

As readers we all celebrated World Book Day with multiple giggles and much discussion around books in general and the legend that is Roald Dahl too. Well done to the children for bringing the required energy and enthusiasm to make it a very memorable day. Linked in with reading is the success of "Indian In The Cupboard" which has really lit a flame under our young learners. The idea of toys coming to life is not a new one, but one that is beautifully expressed and explored within the book. The children have been inspired and have planned, drafted, shared and ultimately written their own stories with similar themes this week. Along with individual targets, all our Year 4 writers are developing their stamina for writing at the moment which is setting them up nicely for the big curriculum jump into Year 5. Any chance at home to write with a purpose is encouraged please.

Fractions are the ongoing flavour of mathematics with us using toys, tool, pictures, chocolate bars and pizzas to aid the understanding of this notoriously tough topic. As always, any perspective from home is welcomed as "how you were taught" methods of understanding may always shed a little light on a tricky subject. In addition, Maths Tutor has ready made teaching and learning opportunities and your child / children should also be continuing to bring home their Blue Arithmetic Folders every Thursday.

Finally, 2 reminders: some of our children are bringing mobile phones into school. This is accepted as long as it is an agreement between the parents and teacher, and that the phone is purposeful (such as being required for them to walk home). Children should not be bringing in mobile phones otherwise. If it is agreed that children do bring in their phone, children must hand it to their teacher who will stow it away for the day until it is returned at 3pm. Earings need to also be studs please. We will endeavour to remind children at our end – if you could support at home.

Year 5

It has been a super week in Year 5!

In our Writing lessons, we have started writing our first persuasive letter to Tim Peake. The children picked their own debate topics, in pairs and using their oracy talking and debating skills constructed their own persuasive letter writing plan. This has linked to our Spring poem that we are practising for our Oracy assembly in a few weeks time, well done to all those children who already know their lines off by heart!

We have continued our work on our class book, Cosmic, in our reading lessons, which are now focussing on using different skills interchangeably-for example, retrieval and inference. In addition, we also joined a live lesson with Tim Peake this week celebrating Science Week, whilst linking our reading and writing work with this.

In Maths, we have worked hard at writing, understanding and comparing decimals. The children have used concrete blocks to help them understand the meaning of decimal places and place value. We are now building on this knowledge and using pictorial examples to help with our learning.

On Wednesday, we had a super track morning with the whole year group-where the children competed against one another in different sports and activities. Well done to everyone for trying their best! We have continued to work hard with our Rights Respecting, French Experience and Paddle work-well done everyone.

Please could we remind everyone to remember to bring in their homework diaries on a Friday to be checked by their form tutor so we can sign these weekly and see that reading with an adult is taking place.
